ometimes we may think that nothing bad will happen to us because we have realized God, and because we also pray to Him everyday. We, however, forget that this God-knowledge can go away. There is no guarantee that it will stay with us.

How do we lose His realization and how do we get closer to Him? Every time we are jealous of someone, hate someone, or breed ill-will, we go farther from God. On the other hand, when we do selfless service (sewa) and indulge in constructive activities, we come closer to God. Sewa brings us closer to our fellow beings and their Creator. There is no better way to gain respect from saints than sewa. There is no better bridge to come closer to God than through selfless service of His people. It is not an easy task. It needs commitment. For example, Sewa Dal volunteers get to the

satsang early to do the set-up, and they leave late after cleaning up. That's commitment. Many people, on the other hand, have a very casual attitude toward the satsang and do not think that sewa is important. They just come to the satsang whenever they wish and leave whenever it suits them. I tell you from what I have seen for many decades in this Mission:

If you go the extra mile on the path of sewa, it brings you closer to saints, Satguru, and Nirankar. Conversely, if you are filled with hatred, jealousy, or evil thoughts toward someone, it widens the gulf between you and the saints, Satguru, and Nirankar.

Special Blessings Await You

Baba Avtar Singh Ji used to say to the devotees, "If it is the day for satsang and you are at home and you don't feel like going to satsang. What should you do? Definitely go to the satsang on that day, because that day you need satsang the most. Attending the satsang on such a day will bring lots of blessings in your life."

Realizing the Divine Is for the Good of All

In this age of science, it is not possible to believe that human life arose in a miraculous way. In the Bible, the birth of human life goes back to Adam and Eve.

While living in Heaven, they disobeyed God. As a result, they were thrown to the earth. Thereafter they became progenitors of human race. Since then the human beings are caught in the cycle of birth and death. Thus goes the story of human life in the ancient religions. In the oriental religions, magic and miracle hold the same way though the nature of events, their occurrence and arrangement is different. In Hinduism, this goes back to the interplay between different gods, Indra, Agni, and so on. In Sikhism, which came into being only five centuries back, human life is believed to have appeared when *nirgun* (formless) changed into *sargun* (living form).

These magical and miraculous stories gave place to the evolutionary explanation of human life. According to this explanation human beings take birth and meet with the death like animals, birds, and trees etc. This may be a fact of nature but it does not satisfy the truth of the mind that impels human beings to rise above the mundane level and seek union with Divine. In Christianity, this realization is believed to come through penitence and resurrection. Hinduism holds that reincarnation makes it possible. In Sikhism, it is the grace of the Almighty that works this wonder. In *Japuji* of Guru Nanak with which the *Adi Granth* opens, human beings aspire for union with the Divine:

How to arrive at the truth? How to break the veil of falsehood?

To this the answer comes from within his soul as under: It is by working according to His will and order Which is written along with man's birth.

Since God who is both the Almighty and Divine is one with the truth for all times to come, so to shower grace upon human beings is an act of supreme pleasure with Him. "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me: for I am meek and lowly of heart and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light (Mathew 11:28-30)." The divine thus sought and realized through the grace of His messenger, the Satguru, ultimately becomes a quality of human being's mind. It turns out to be his own sympathy for the suffering humanity, all pervasive feeling of goodwill toward the world, the vegetation, the trees, birds, and animals. Bone Marrow Registry:

Commendable Enthusiasm Transcending the Barriers of Faith

ndian Community support has been pouring in ever since the word got out that one of our fellow devotees, Varinderpal Sandhu, is in need of a bone marrow transplant. Varinderpal, a 32-year-old engineer, is son-in-law of our saint Ajit Singh Sooch, local Sanchalak, Tracy, California. Varinderpal is suffering from acute Lymphoblast Leukemia, a life-threatening disease. He has a six-year-old daughter and a three-year-old son. His wife Jyoti grew up in the local Sangat. Varinderpal has been admitted to the University of California at San Francisco Medical Center. He has undergone extensive chemotherapy for 9 months. He is in need of bone marrow transplant. The marrow taken from the only sibling, a sister, did not match. The experts in the field have suggested looking for a donor among the general population in general and of Indian descent in particular.

Dr. Romesh Japra a well-known cardiologist of Punjabi descent took a leading role in spearheading the blood sampling drive in California. India Post, a well known weekly newspaper published simultaneously from California, Washington DC, Chicago, Atlanta and New York and television stations, all owned by Dr. Japra are giving extensive coverage to this event.

the Sant Nirankari Bhawan in Tracy on February 23. People from the surrounding towns started lining up at the Bhawan. Talking to one of the new arrivals at the Bhawan, Dr. Rai asked one Kuldip Singh of the nearby town of Manteca as to how he found out about this event. The response from all the Sikh temples has been tremendous. During one of the conversations with the local Gurdwara Head Priest, a Nirankari member told him that the sick boy is a Nirankari. "We are all born as humans and saving a human life is our utmost duty. It has nothing to do with one's religion or belief," said Mr. Parwinder Singh, Head Priest of the Stockton Gurdwara, the oldest Sikh temple of North America. The management committee of the Stockton Gurdwara scheduled a drive on Sunday, March 23 at the Gurdwara.

two-day blood and bone marrow drive was also conducted at the Berkley Campus of the University of California on Wednesday, March 12 and Thursday, March 13. It was largely attended by the student community.

New York Metropolitan Area

hone marrow registry drive was held on Sunday, April 6 at the Satsang Bhawan. The camp was set up in a room adjacent to the satsang hall and continued while the congregation was going on. The entire process was very orderly. The donors went into the registry area before entering the congregation hall. Seventy-two devotees from New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, and Pennsylvania were able to give blood samples and register for this noble cause. Many others were disappointed that

Nirankari Bhawans in the United States and Canada: Part 1

This is the first write-up in a series of articles about the Satsang Bhawans in the United States and Canada. In the next issue, there will be a write-up about the Toronto Satsang Bhawan.

Tracy Satsang Bhawan

he Nirankari Bhawan is located 60 miles North East of San Francisco, near the town of Tracy. The property was acquired in January 1992, but the Bhawan site was originally, and coincidently, visited by Baba Gurbachan Singh Ji Maharaj in 1971, during his first salvation tour of North America. At that time, I had just finished my Doctorate degree at the University of Wyoming and come to California to receive Baba Ji and Pujya Rajmata Ji and assist them in their road travel in the US. While driving through the little town of Tracy, I asked Babaji's permission to appear for an interview with a large Agri. Business companies which was interested in hiring me. Babaji and party waited outside, standing under a tree while I was interviewing inside. Babaji admired the area and we left for onward journev. The site of the Tracy Bhawan is not far from where Babaji stood that day, though we did not know for a long time that a Bhawan would even exist for us anywhere in the West.

On the conclusion of BabaJi's first

spiritual tour of the United States, I settled in this area. After acquisition of a 7 acre property of an old one-room school, the work was started in phases. In the first phase, the hall of the existing school was renovated and the sangats started. His Holiness Baba Hardev Singh Ji performed the opening on July 4, 1992.

Within a few years the attendance outgrew the available space in the hall and the planning for Phase 2 was started. More and more families started relocating in towns around the Bhawan. In the Spring of 1997 Rev. K.R. Chadha visited us and brought the final permission of His Holiness to go ahead and plan for the construction of a new prayer hall. The foundation stone of the new building under Phase 2 was laid down by His Holiness and Mata Sawinder Ji on June 7, 1998. The new building consists of 3100 sq. ft. main sanctuary seating over 300 people, four classrooms, a nursery, a spacious lobby, an office, reception, library, and restrooms. The Bhawan was nearing completion when Baba Ji paid another visit in Summer of 1999.

In April 2000, His Holiness blessed that Rev. Daljit S. Lakha, a long-time resident of Bahrain be relocated to live at the Tracy Bhawan. Rev. Lakha brings us many years of Mission sewa experience done in Gulf countries. His wife and children have since joined him. His Holiness Babaji performed the opening ceremony on August 29, 2001. At the same time his Holiness blessed us to start building the residence as a part of the third phase. Phase 3 has recently been completed.

Plans are on the drawing board for Phase 4 which consists of laying out the playgrounds and landscaping. The proposed playgrounds will be a baseball diamond, basketball court, soccer or cricket field, tennis and badminton courts, etc.

Sunday services at the Bhawan are held from 11am to 1 pm and a midweek Sangat is held on Wednesdays 7 to 9 pm. The Bhawan caters to the need of saints living in Northern and Central California as far as Yuba City up North and Fresno and Hanford down South.



Other Scheduled Drives


